Taylor & Francis: On-campus Off-campus

T&F Online is comprised of multiple academic databases containing full-text journal articles and other relevant resources. Sometimes you may need to try one of the databases above for online full text. Or see where the hard copies are.

Religious and Theological Abstracts (RTA): On-campus Off-campus

Abstract and indexing database with broad coverage in all areas of religion and theology.

Indexes and provides summaries to articles appearing in 400+ scholarly journals relating to religion and theology. Includes many Catholic, Jewish and other world religion titles and provides English language abstracts of articles in English, Hebrew, Afrikaans, and major European languages. Articles in the fields of pastoral ministry, counseling, sociology, anthropology, and urban studies.

In Library Resources

Patrologiae Graecae: On-campus [only in library]

Contains more than 160 volumes of Greek material (with Latin translations) relevant to the study of the history of the Christian Church from its beginnings through the Council of Florence in 1439.

PG is a collection of the writings of the church leaders who wrote in Greek, including both the Eastern "Fathers" and those Western Christians who wrote before the Latin takeover of the West in the third century. It includes, for example, the early writings collectively known as the Apostolic Fathers, such as the Epistles of Clement and The Shepherd of Hermas, the church historian Eusebius, the controversial theologian Origen, and the Cappadocian Fathers Basil the Great, Gregory of Nazianzus, and Gregory of Nyssa. PG 's coverage extends to 1439, the date of the Council of Florence.

CLCLT: Library of Latin Texts (CETEDOC): On-campus [only in library]

CLCLT is the world's leading database for Latin texts. It contains texts from the beginning of Latin literature (Livius Andronicus, 240 BC) through to the texts of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965). It covers all the works from the classical period, the most important patristic works, a very extensive corpus of Medieval Latin literature as well as works of recentior latinitas. The complete works of writers such as Cicero, Virgil, Augustine, Jerome, Gregory the Great, Anselm of Canterbury, Bernard of Clairvaux and Thomas a Kempis can thus be consulted. The texts have been taken from the Corpus Christianorum series and from many other leading editions--Publisher's website.
