FROM THE DEAN

The pace of our steps has quickened, small talks are getting shorter and snappier, each meal takes about what it takes for someone preparing for a competitive eating contest, and our brains have been working overtime, uncertain of where the energy is coming from — Coffee! Yes, that magical drink that contains all the calories we need and then some. We are making a mad dash toward the finish line — commencement dates are set in stone and deadlines for papers and projects can't be negotiated — the end is near and we are not going to slow down until we come out of the tunnel. We've run this race before. However, it feels different this time around. We all have been burdened with unanticipated assaults on our body, mind, and spirit that required us to respond in one way or another to the actions and rhetoric of the current U.S. administration. Here are five incidents that required emotional labor and increased my stress level over this semester.

Women's March on January 21st in response to the current administration's willingness to compromise women's health, value, and dignity. To see friends and colleagues fly to Washington D.C. to participate in the march was indeed inspirational.

March for Science on April 22^{nd} in protest over politicians and policy makers ignoring or denying the validity of scientific facts in their decisions. One of the signs I saw on the internet said, "I can't believe I'm actually defending facts!"

The GTU came up with its solidarity statement in order to reiterate its resolve to stand with those who are threatened by the new political and cultural climate (http://gtu.edu/news/gtu-solidarity-statement). Moreover, the Student Advisory Committee has been working all semester to roll out a welcoming campaign in response to Executive Order 13769 and then Executive Order 13780.

The Council of Deans is working on a statement in response to the proposed budget cuts to national endowments and libraries that certainly will have negative ramifications for education.

Finally, the escalating tension between North Korea and the United States has become a cause of concern and anxiety, especially among South Korean students at GTU. Kim Jung Un's outrageous rhetoric and political maneuvers have been repeatedly played before, by his father before him, and by his grandfather before his father. Nothing is new here. What's different in this hackneyed drama is our President Trump. He wants to take on the young dictator of an extremely impoverished nation (population: 25 million; income per capita: \$1,800). The so-called Dear Leader couldn't be happier to have President Trump's attention and to be perceived as a worthy opponent of the most powerful nation in the world. North Koreans have nothing to lose; their conditions can't get any worse. Americans have little to lose; the carnage will occur about 7,000 miles from Washington DC. It's South Koreans who have most to lose and will live in fear and anxiety as long as the tension remains. Who cares? We care and, therefore, we carry our emotional and spiritual burden as we walk toward our next task.

INSTITUTE FOR BUDDHIST STUDIES

The Institute of Buddhist Studies is happy to announce the return of its annual graduate symposium in the fall of 2017.

Mass Meditation: Practices and Discourses in Contemporary Global Buddhisms October 6th, 2017—Institute of Buddhist Studies Berkeley, California

This conference will focus on the phenomenon of mass meditation (e.g., lay meditation practices, mindfulness, secularization) in contemporary global Buddhism. Of particular focus will be the means by which Buddhist meditation is understood and promoted in various contexts. We welcome submissions that consider how meditation has gained an ambivalent relationship to Buddhism—sometimes being promoted as a "spiritual technology" not connected to any particular tradition, sometimes as the condition sine qua non for Buddhist identity and the only practice recommended by the Buddha.

Topics include but are not limited to: the origins and popularization of lay meditation practices in Burma, Thailand and Sri Lanka; the Vipassanā (Insight) and Mindfulness movements in North America, Europe, and Asia; meditation practice and the construction of Buddhist identity or subjectivity; the "mystification" of meditation in promotional literature; the use of scientific language to justify and promote meditation both within and beyond Buddhist contexts.

Dr. Erik Braun, Associate Professor of Religious Studies at the University of Virginia and author of The Birth of Insight (winner of the 2014 Toshihide Numata Book Award in Buddhism), will serve as the symposium's keynote speaker.

Graduate students at any stage of their program are encouraged to submit paper proposals. Please send abstracts of no more than 500 words to Thomas Calobrisi (<u>tcalobrisi@ses.gtu.edu</u>). The deadline for submission is July 15, 2017. Applicants will be notified about their submission by August 15, 2017.

Limited travel funds may be available; low-cost housing is available on site at the Iodo Shinshu Center.


