

GTU Joins JSTOR as Contributor



The GTU's Special Collections and Archives are participating in a pilot project with other California institutions to share their unique collections on JSTOR. Part of an Open Community Collections Pilot, six of our online collections are now accessible on the JSTOR platform, thanks to the work of David Stiver, Special Collections Librarian.

The collections available for view on JSTOR are <u>Center for Women and Religion</u>, <u>Religious Leaders in California</u>, <u>Remembering Theological Education in the Sixties</u>, <u>Right On</u>, <u>The Pacific Coast Theological Society</u>, and <u>Tower of Religion and Temple of Peace 1938-1940</u>. Each provides insight into religious activities at the GTU and throughout the Bay Area.

The purpose of the project is to provide broader access to primary sources from a variety of libraries, museums, archives, and historical societies for researchers on a single site. We encourage you to check out some of the hidden gems!

Account Login Changes (And Electronic Resources Access)

• How to login to Library Resources? We have made logging in more secure. The first time you log in, you will create a PIN that gives you full access to ebooks, online journals, and your account-from anywhere! Chat us if you have trouble setting up your PIN. For students who do not know your Student ID number, please look in your registration system.

Service Changes

- Hybrid Reference Desk: To support students worldwide and in Berkeley, we are introducing a hybrid reference desk. The Ask-a-librarian chat will be available every weekday, 9 am- 4 pm (Pacific time), plus in-person hours on some days. Online research appointments are available daily in Zoom. See: https://www.gtu.edu/library/get-help
- Curbside pick-up continues. If you don't feel comfortable coming into the building or do not have your ID, we can bring the books out to you. No reservations are needed; request the books in the catalog, and when you are notified by email that they are on the hold shelf, park at the green curb in front of the building between 10 am and 5 pm and call the circulation desk. Someone will bring the books out to you.
- Scanning for distance students and faculty: For individuals not near the Bay Area, we can scan articles and chapters from the shelf. And for everyone who is here, the book scanner will be available in the library again.



- Workshops, Tutorials, and Orientations: We will be offering these live online and pre-recorded.
- Visit the Library workshops page for the links. If you don't see what you are looking for, just ask; we can always meet with you by appointment to help.
- The Seminar B room will be reservable online again. As this is a small enclosed space, we are limiting it to one person at a time to have a space for you to practice a presentation, take a Zoom meeting, or online interview.
- Lockers are available starting Sept. 6th. Students, instructors, and visiting scholars can reserve a free locker for the semester. Visit the circulation desk to sign up.

Collection changes

- We have added many new databases and electronic collections in the past year, including ProQuest Dissertation and Thesis Database, Kotar Digital Library, ArtStor, Oxford Bibliography of Biblical Studies, LGBTQ+ Source, Digitalia Hispanica, and more.
- More ebooks! There are more ebooks in our collection than ever before, all available via our Summon search, and it's not just newly published books; we've purchased electronic copies of some of our most highly used titles, such as the Biblical commentaries.
- If you are in the Bay Area, you have access to the libraries at UC-Berkeley and the 11 million items in their collections. They will reopen their libraries on Aug. 25th.
- Don't see the book that you want? Use the Suggest a Purchase form on the homepage. We can usually get ebooks within a few days if they are available from our vendors.
- Coming soon, big changes in the library building- we will be moving books around, some collections will be taken out for digitizing, and there will be a lot of action and noise.

For instructors

- Class instruction sessions & customized tutorials are available. We can come to your classroom, you could bring your class to the library, we can meet live in Zoom, or the librarians can prerecord a lesson for you to post in your class space.

CARe's Post Doctoral Fellow in East Asian Art & Religion, Dr. Dessi Vendova, will give our first event of the semester, a presentation of her recent work on the life of the Buddha. This talk had to be postponed last semester, so if you missed it then, don't miss it now!

Visual representations of the Buddha Shakyamuni's extended biography have a ubiquitous presence at early Buddhist sites such as stupas and rock-cut cave temples and played an important part in the spread of Buddhism. This phenomenon started in India, and spread and developed far beyond, with a significant




and revolutionary impact on the cultures it reached. This talk will focus on narrative and visual depictions of previous life stories (*jataka*) in which the Bodhisattva (the-Buddha-to-be) performed extreme acts of generosity that involved acts of bodily self-sacrifice.

Center for Theology and the Natural Sciences

A Strigilated Universe: The Cosmogonic Significance of Primordial Gravitation Radiation

Wednesday, September 22 | 5-6pm (Pacific Time) | Online

In 2015, for the first time ever, scientists announced the detection of gravitational waves spun out into the universe by the merger of two black holes. Numerous detection events have since been recorded, and upgrades continue to increase experimental sensitivity. There is one important class of gravitational waves, however, that still eludes scientists: the so-called primordial gravitational waves likely to have been produced in the earliest moments of our universe. Observation of these waves—the gravitational equivalent of the cosmic microwave background, though significantly older—could reveal much about the origin of the visible universe. In this presentation I review these developments and discuss their implications for our understanding of how the visible universe began. I also discuss a related tension in the construction of theories of the early universe that sheds light on the challenge of doing physics on "the whole."

Engaging Hypotheticals: Groundwork for the Study of Theology in a Secular Academic Context

Saturday, September 25 | 1-3pm (Pacific Time) | Online

The 2021 Annual Russell Family Research Conference will be lead by Russell Family Research Fellow Dr. Kirk Wegter-McNelly.

The study of religion in the secular academy is dominated by the "religious studies" approach, which situates theological ideas within their social context and privileges the cornucopic variety of lived religion over more systematized expressions of religious thought. In religious academic contexts the sociological and psychological dimensions of religion often take a back seat to theological explication of scripture and tradition. One possibility elided by this dichotomy is the study of theological ideas and traditions from a secular perspective.


In this talk, Dr. Kirk Wegter-McNelly will explore the potential fruits of treating theological claims not from a confessional perspective as products of "faith seeking understanding" but from a secular perspective as hypotheses to be investigated alongside those of science. Dr. Wegter-McNelly's analysis hinges on the notion that hypotheses worthy of our consideration are not always testable hypotheses.
